Special topics in Constitutional Law class has already come to an end. I learned many new things in this class by preparing for three presentations and by listening to presentations prepared by other classmates.

At first, I couldn't adapt to the materials taught in the class because they were not only about law but also about sociology, psychology and economics. Since this year is already the third year I am studying in a Korean law school, it was really hard for me to use my right brain; to think beyond just codes of law and explore different areas of studies.

I had a chance to approach the concept of "right" in a completely new way. In the beginning, I couldn't understand neither Weber's definition of "right" nor why we had to make presentations on power, utility, bureaucracy etc. which we weren't familiar with. It was really hard for me to prepare presentations on "externalities" and "public goods" because I didn't have any prior knowledge.

But now after one semester of this class and by preparing for the final exam paper, I am able to understand Weber's definition of "right" and this was only possible because I explored many different areas of studies related to this definition.
